



Provisional map of open country and registered common land in upper northwest England

The Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 will create new rights to walk on 'access land' – generally mountain, moor, heath, down and registered common land. The Countryside Agency is required to produce maps of registered common land and open country in preparation for the introduction of the new public access rights.

The provisional map for upper northwest England was issued on 19 August 2003. It includes changes (which may be additions, deletions or re-categorisations) to the areas shown as registered common land and open country on the draft map issued by the Agency for consultation between 10 December 2002 and 10 March 2003.

The electronic provisional map at a larger scale may be viewed at our London, Cheltenham, Bristol or Manchester offices - phone the helpline for an appointment.

Appeals against the provisional map

Anyone with a legal interest in the land (e.g. a landowner, tenant, or the holder of sporting or common rights) may appeal against it being shown as registered common land or open country on the provisional map.

How to appeal

Appeals must be made to the Secretary of State on one of the following grounds:

- 1) where land is mapped as registered common land, that it is not registered common land.
- 2) where land is mapped as open country that:
 - (i) it does not consist wholly or predominantly of mountain, moor, heath or down: and
 - (ii) where the Agency has exercised its discretion under the Act, to treat land which is not open country as forming part of an area of open country, it ought not to have done so.
